World Epilepsy Day – Raise Epilepsy Awareness

Annually on March 26th, people in countries around the world are invited to wear purple and host events in support of epilepsy awareness. Did you know...worldwide, 65 million people have some form of epilepsy (that equals 1 in every 100 people!) Also did you know...that in 50% of cases, the cause of epilepsy is unknown?

In making sure Pennsylvania school personnel are ready to respond when a student has a seizure, I have introduced Senate Bill 999, The Seizure-Safe Schools Act.

Epilepsy is a neurological condition that can strike without warning. The Epilepsy Foundation Eastern Pennsylvania estimates that 110,000 people across its 18-county region, including in the Lehigh Valley, are living with epilepsy. Nationally, the CDC reports that 1 in 10 people will experience a seizure at some point in their lives.

Right now, Pennsylvania law only permits school staff to take seizure response training. That's not good enough. Our bill would require all school nurses and staff with direct student contact to complete seizure recognition and first aid training every two years, using a program approved by the Department of Health.

No family should have to wonder whether their child will be safe at school if a seizure happens. This bill ensures every school is ready.

*This bill will mirror companion legislation in HB 1045 of 2025.

SeizureFirstAid

What to do in the event of a seizure

1

STAY with the person and start timing the seizure. Remain *calm* and check for medical ID.

2

Keep the person **SAFE**. Move or guide away from *harmful objects*.

3

Turn the person onto their **SIDE** if they are not awake and aware. *Don't block airway*, put something small and soft under the head, loosen tight clothes around neck.

4

Do **NOT** put *anything* in their mouth. Don't give water, pills or food until the person is awake.

5

Do **NOT** *restrain*.

6

STAY with them until they are awake and alert after the seizure. *Most seizures end in a few minutes.*

Call 911:

- Seizure lasts longer than 5 minutes
- Repeated seizures
- Difficulty breathing
- Seizure occurs in water
- Person is injured, pregnant, or sick
- Person does not return to their usual state
- First time seizure
